Director's Notebook

I've never found a deer antler in the woods, and I wondered why.

Antlers have one major purpose—to help increase the deer population. They help male deer (bucks) establish territory by rubbing a thin covering (velvet) against saplings. This leaves scent to mark boundaries. Bucks use them to shove other bucks around to establish "top buck". Antlers also help attract females (does).

Antlers are bones which grow and then die and fall off every year. They can grow a half inch per day, starting in April or May. The size of the antlers are determined mostly by nutrition, not age. The antler bone dies and falls off in mid—December.

Vermont has thousands of deer, so where are the piles of antlers? *Somebody eats them!*

The antler is full of calcium and phosphorus and they get eaten by rodents. Mice, squirrels, rabbits and porcupines all have teeth strong enough to chew bone, and they eat almost all of them.

Humans have been using antler bone for tools, needles, and decoration as long ago as the Paleolithic times to the present

We're planning on some laying hens as well as some young chicks and

we're hoping for a few goslings hatched to our own beloved geese. Spring should be an exciting time!

I hope this finds all of you well and happy. While winter has its charms, it feels like we all spend a lot of time waiting for camp to come and I am looking forward to seeing you again soon!



Who's Already at Camp?

Darcey likes to publish "who's coming to camp." I thought it would be fun to write about who is already here. The following have all been seen by one of the winter staff at either camp. Except - of course, the hibernators.

Probably the most populous are the rodents - mice, shrews, voles, rabbits, gray squirrels, red squirrels, and at least one porcupine. Mice, shrews, and voles, who all live in the subnivean layer under the snow had a tough time until we finally got snow. They were still here but had no place to hide from their predators. Some of them made it through, certainly, because their tunnels showed up as soon as there was snow cover. The predator group was also easier to identify once there was snow; they left tracks everywhere. We've seen some of the actual animals, which is always exciting: we saw a Brown Weasel, an Ermine (not yet all white) and probably a Fisher. There are lots of red or gray fox tracks, White-tail Deer, and rabbits, (a couple have learned to eat birdseed!) We also see tracks of gray and red squirrels. I think I saw bobcat tracks but am not sure. I keep hoping to hear coyotes sing, but so far not this winter.

There are hibernators hidden away in nests and dens all through the woods and in Burr Pond. Salamanders, newts, several kinds of turtles are snuggled in the pond mud. Somewhere on the Hilltop is a woodchuck den (too close to the garden!) and surely some chipmunks. And, although they are solitary in the summer, garter snakes like to hibernate in a snake ball to stay a little warmer. Finally, I count at least 15 kinds of birds at the Farmhouse feeder, and out in the woods I see and hear hawks, crows, ravens, owls, turkeys, and at least one big pileated woodpecker. All of us await your arrival in June.
